Familial Impact

Parental Drug Abuse

- Impaired ability to provide supervision, guidance and emotional support to children
- Higher rates of conflict, separation and divorce

Children of Drug Abusers

- More likely to suffer from anxiety, depression and behavioural issues
- Increased risk of drug abuse or other criminal behaviour in adolescence or adulthood

Siblings of Drug Abusers

- May experience feelings of resentment, anxiety or low self-esteem
- May suffer from long-term emotional and relational challenges



Individual Impact

Acute Toxicity

- Paranoia and panic attacks
- Dilated pupils, strokes and seizures

Long-term Health Issues

- Respiratory problems
- Sleep disturbances
- Impulsivity and irritability
- Anxiety and depression



Societal Impact

Crime and Social Disintegration

- Communities with high rates of drug abuse often experience:
 - poverty
 - homelessness
 - **ブ** violence
 - crime rates
- Eroded community trust, reduced social cohesion and diminished quality of life
